Community Resource Database

Inmates release from facilities across the country, often returning or relocating to other states to reside.

Welcome to the Community Resource Database

Bureau of Prisons inmates release from facilities across the country, often returning or relocating to other states to reside. This database is designed to provide information to assist releasing offenders with identifying and connecting with local support resources within their releasing state and/or local community. By establishing connections with service providers **prior to release**, inmates can take an active role in their release planning and enhance their opportunity for a successful return as a viable member of their community.

The database contains national and local service providers within ten broad service areas (definitions provided). Search engines by state, service, or provider open a grid indicating the support services offered within the state and by which organization, along with a brief description and contact information.
