EBDM ONE LESS Principles...

1. The professional judgment of criminal justice system decision makers is enhanced when informed by evidence-based knowledge
2. Every interaction within the criminal justice system offers an opportunity to contribute to harm reduction
3. Systems achieve better outcomes when they operate collaboratively
4. The criminal justice system will continually learn and improve when professionals make decisions based on the collection, analysis, and use of data and information

Eau Claire County Guiding Principles

- Assessment tools should be utilized to identify risk to re-offend, criminogenic needs and appropriate programming
- Intense programming is reserved for medium and high risk offenders
- Programming for medium and high risk offenders focused on individual criminogenic needs
- Responses to misconduct should be swift, certain and proportionate
- Positive reinforcements are more effective than sanctions and should outnumber them
- Programming delivered in natural settings are more effective than programming in institutional settings
